## SCOUTS

(Chartered by National Council of the Boy Scouts of America.)

### SCHOOLSHIP AND SCOUTING

That boy scouts stand high because of their scout training in the activities of their schools is attested in the responsibility placed upon them in the classroom work and play, school activities and student government.

The presidents of the freshmen, sophomore, junior and senior classes the past school year in the Pasadena High school were boy scouts.

Three of those class presidents are Eagle Scouts, the others are in First Class rank. The four leaders have records of efficient and active participation in all school activities, and have been outstanding members in athletic games, in dramatics, and in school management and executive work.

The "Student Government" of Pasadena School No. 9, Quonon, N. Y., furnishes an example of the demands that are made upon scouts because of their training in group responsibility. The way in which the scouts have carried out their duties in school management has won the praise of the executive of the system. Mrs. Bridget Frazzini, the principal of the school, who says that the plan would not have worked out half as successfully had it not been for the existence of the school's scout troop.

In this unique self-government plan, members of the scout troop, in addition to several other pupils, act as officers. "Scouting has helped us remarkably in the performance of our duties," Mrs. Frazzini says. "We find that by making the scout troop and favoring them, we have to attend by the student body, the work is carried out in a far more efficient manner than it would be ordinarily. I believe that all school principals ought to back by the scout movement and do all in their power to encourage the organization of troops in the schools of which they are in charge."

The duties of the police commissioners consist in maintaining discipline about the school building, the park commissary in keeping the grounds of the building in a sanitary condition, and the health commissioners in maintaining the interior of the structure in a hygienic state at all times.

## GIVE NEW LIFE TO PINS

Company Formed in New York for the Purpose of Cleaning and Re-Pointing Them.

That this was and still unaccounted for, "What because of all the old pins?" seems to be the only way of being answered in New York City at least, for a company has been formed for the purpose of refashioning used pins and restoring them to their original usefulness. Not that representatives of the company are to patrol the streets gathering up discarded pins, but it is said that in some of the large department stores the pin bins themselves reach as high as 18" annually. Used only once, the pins are removed and allowed to drop on the floor, where they are swept into a receptacle. At the close of the day, the pins are too dirty to be used again, and the company's monthly program to effect a saving in the pin line by refashioning all the used pins, cleaning and re-pointing them.

More than a year of experiment was necessary in order to discover a process for satisfactorily refashioning the pins. At first it was thought that if the pins already were gathered by means of a magnet instead of sweeping, they could be used again without re-pointing, but when it was found that the pins retained enough of the finer dust to soil white fabrics and make their use impracticable. A process was finally discovered, however, whereby the refashioned pins can be returned to the user at half the cost of the new product and still the refashioning company will be enabled to make a fair working profit.


