A lot of work is needed in the coming months if any community consciousness is to occur.

Thanks to Don Gudin, who speeded up our incorporation procedure so, we have received notice that as of Sept. 8, the articles of incorporation were accepted by the Sec. of State. As soon as we hear from the Franchise Tax board about our tax exemption, we should begin fund-raising.

At a board meeting in early September, priorities were set up for parcels of land which we must go after as links in the park. The stagecoach properties are now on the market and these must be saved.

One suggestion for fund-raising is the selling of pocket deeds, small parcels to be sold to individuals and families. This could be an exciting community endeavor to raise enthusiasm.

We hope to meet with the owners of the property before long and see what options we can come up with. All attempts to get the governments interested have been unsuccessful because of fund shortages for park acquisition.

Mike Wolfe, our vice-president, has accepted a ranger post with the State Parks Department. We wish him well. Someone (is it you?) must fill the post.

In other news, Councilman Robert Wilkenson presented a motion to the L.A. City Council (seconded by Tom Bradley) in support of the state bill to conduct a feasibility study of the park area for the Federal regional parks program. The bill, which passed the state legislature, should enter the study stage soon.
